Veteran Spotlight


DONALD J. SCHROEDER, PHD

Hi! My name is Donald Schroeder. I am 83 years old. My family moved to Whitestone in 1946 when I was seven years old, and I have remained a resident of this oasis of NYC ever since. My father was an NYPD sergeant and my mom cooked for the priests from St. Luke's for over twenty-five years.

In 1952 I graduated from St Luke's grammar school and for the next four years I traveled for about three hours a day back and forth from Whitestone to downtown Brooklyn to attend Bishop Loughlin Memorial High School. Upon graduation in 1956 I was very proud to become a plebe majoring in marine engineering at the United States Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point. Four years later I graduated from Kings Point with honors and was awarded a Bachelor of Science degree, a commission as a Lieutenant in the United States Navy, and a Coast Guard issued license to sail as a Third Assistant Engineer on United States merchant ships. At the time of my graduation from Kings Point compulsory military service was still in effect. Therefore, to satisfy this military obligation, I sailed in the merchant marine for three years and visited dozens of foreign countries in the process. The primary life lesson I learned from that three-year period was how extremely fortunate I was to have been born in the USA. I truly wish that all the present-day critics of this country knew more about the living conditions in many foreign countries. If they did, I believe they might temper their criticism.

After I satisfied my military obligation, in 1964 I fulfilled my lifelong desire to become a member of the New York City Police

Department. Then in 1967 I was promoted to the rank of sergeant, in 1969 I became a lieutenant, and in 1973 I achieved the rank of captain. By going from a rookie cop to a captain in less than ten years I am proud to say that I was the first person to ever do so. Most of the credit for that achievement, however, belongs to my father. He was my constant advisor, he paid the tuition for the many promotion preparation schools I attended, and, more importantly, constantly motivated me to achieve.

Perhaps the sagest advice my dad gave me was to continue my formal education. As a result, during the time I was working in the NYPD I earned a Master's Degree in Public Administration and a Master's Degree in Philosophy, both from John Jay College of Criminal Justice. Another career shaping event occurred in 1975 when I was loaned by the Police Commissioner to the Education Testing Service at Princeton University to help develop a more valid entrance and promotional process for the NYPD. The six months that I then worked at Princeton laid the foundation for my second career as discussed later. In 1981 my police career came to abrupt end when I was forced to leave the department because of an injury I suffered when trying to quell a street riot that occurred when I was the Commanding Officer of the 81st Precinct in the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn. Fortunately, upon my retirement from the NYPD I was offered a position as an Adjunct Professor at John Jay College working with the Dean of Special Programs which I eagerly accepted. At that time John Jay was not a state certified Police Academy and, along with a long-term colleague of mine, I was assigned to work with various state agencies to have John Jay certified as a Police Academy which we accomplished in about a year's time. It was during this time that I went back to my post graduate studies at the City University of New York. This led to my being awarded a Ph D in Criminal Justice in 1987.

It was about this time when serendipity led me and Frank Lombardo, my previously mentioned long term colleague, to become the Criminal Justice Authors for the Barrons Book Company. In that capacity we published five books to help those who want to gain entrance into and earn promotion in various law enforcement agencies. One of our books, originally published in 1984, "How to Prepare for the Police Officer Exam", is currently in its tenth edition and has to date sold over 400,000 copies.

It was also about this time when my partner and I left John Jay College and formed our own consulting company which we called "Rems Training Associates". Then during the next thirty years we traveled up and down the east coast holding seminars designed to help thousands of candidates enter and become successful in various criminal justice agencies.

I am currently "almost" fully retired and enjoy my life with Liz, my beautiful wife of over 32 years, who was an NYPD detective when she retired in 2004. In reflecting back over my career, I deem myself a very lucky guy to have been born into a nuclear family with a role model father who understood the value of a good education and sacrificed to make sure his children went to college. I also will always be grateful to have grown up in Whitestone. I can't imagine a finer place to live.


A rare photograph of Whitestone station masters H. V. Truitt and R. E. Jordan posing on the track side of the Whitestone Long Island Railroad station in 1914.

The three level station house, which closed on February 12, 1932 and was torn down in March of 1933, was located opposite what is now Verdis on the Cross Island Parkway.

During the flu pandemic of 1918, passengers waiting for the train refused to enter the station because it was scrubbed daily with disinfectant causing people's eyes to water and burn. Truitt and Jordan lived upstairs while the lower level featured the waiting room, a coffee shop and taxi service.



BURGLARY ALERT

THERE HAS BEEN A RECENT INCREASE IN BURGLARIES WITHIN THE AREA. HERE ARE A FEW SAFETY TIPS TO HELP SAFEGUARD YOU AND YOUR FAMILY.

- 1. PLEASE CLOSE THE BUILDING DOOR BEHIND YOU. DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR FOR ANYONE WHO YOU DO NOT RECOGNIZE. IF THEY LIVE IN THE BUILDING THEY SHOULD HAVE A KEY.
- 2. DO NOT BUZZ ANYONE INTO THE BUILDING USING THE INTERCOM IF YOU DO NOT KNOW WHO THEY ARE. ALWAYS CHECK TO SEE WHO THAT PERSON IS.
- 3. BEFORE YOU LEAVE YOUR HOUSE, PLEASE CHECK TO ENSURE YOUR WINDOWS ARE CLOSED AND LOCKED. CLOSE ALL DRAPES WHEN YOU LEAVE. BE SURE TO USE ALL THE LOCKS ON YOUR FRONT DOOR.
- 4. IF YOU HAVE AN AIR CONDITIONER MAKE SURE IT IS SCREWED TO THE WINDOW FRAME SO THAT IT CAN NOT BE EASILY PUSHED IN.
- 5. CLEAR AWAY ALL GARBAGE CANS AND LADDERS FROM THE SIDE AND BACK OF YOUR HOUSE. THEY CAN BE USED TO CLIMB INTO WINDOWS.
- 6. TAKE OUT YOUR KEY WHILE YOU ARE WALKING TOWARDS YOUR BUILDING OR FRONT DOOR, THIS WAY YOU CAN GET IN QUICKLY AND CLOSE THE DOOR BEHIND YOU.
- 7. IF YOU WILL NOT BE HOME FOR AN EXTENDED PERIOD OF TIME, HAVE THE POST OFFICE HOLD YOUR MAIL UNTIL YOU RETURN HOME.

VEHICLE AND TOOL THEFT ALERT



A Message from the 109th Precinct

There have been recent incidents where commercial work vehicles are being stolen. Also, the vehicles are being broken into and the tools inside are being stolen. Please follow these crime prevention tips to best safeguard your vehicle and tools inside.

- Close all windows and lock all doors.
- Strengthen your windows with security film or grating.
- Install a "hockey puck" lock and hasp to the doors to prevent intrusion into the vehicle.
- Equip vehicle with an audible car alarm and a GPS Tracker.
- Park in a well lit area and within range of a camera.
- Activate any theft deterrent devices you have.
- If a suspicious person is around your vehicle, call 911 with a description or license plate number of involved vehicle.
- Join the police department's anti-auto theft programs.

Please follow these crime prevention tips to avoid becoming a victim.


- Keep doors LOCKED at all times. Keep windows up.
- Do not store any valuables in your vehicle. (Electronic devices, cash, credit cards, purses, etc.)
- Activate any security devices your vehicle may have.
- If you must leave property unattended, place them out of plain sight inside a locked trunk.
- To the best extent possible, always try to park your vehicle in a well lit area within range and unobstructed view of a camera.

CATALYTIC CONVERTER THEFT ALERT







A Message from the 109th Precinct

Catalytic Converters are being targeted for theft. Please follow these crime prevention tips to avoid becoming a victim.

- Many of these thefts occur in the middle of the night, so pay attention to suspicious persons or vehicles.
- To the best extent possible, always try to park your vehicle in a well lit area within range and unobstructed view of a video camera.
- Activate any <u>alarms</u> you may have, preferably one with a tilt sensor that will trigger with just the slightest
 motion.
- Visit an auto mechanic to have the converter welded with hardened steel to secure it to the vehicle's frame.
- Engrave your license plate number on the converter to make it traceable.
- The community's involvement is essential in catching a thief, so if you see any suspicious activity call 911.
