

Dominick Totino Good Neighbor Award



I'm a first generation Italian. We lived in Corona when I was born in 1958 and moved to Whitestone in 1961. I went to St. Luke's, then onto Holy Cross HS. It was suggested by my computer teacher at Cross that I should look into a computer career and was placed at Lehman College to begin my studies as a computer science engineer major. After a year or two, I felt it wasn't for me and switched to being a Math major just so I could graduate and begin the transition of taking over my dad's landscape contracting business with my twin brother.

I had bought a camera, a Canon AE-1, because I hated the crappy pics my mom took over the holidays, but I had no clue of what I was doing. At Lehman, part of my course studies was to take art electives. I took painting, drawing, art history, and figured it a good idea to take photography 101 so I might be able to learn how to use my new camera. I eventually got the hang of what all the numbers on the camera meant and after that epiphany I quickly started falling in love with the artform.

My professor saw something in me and nurtured me over the next few years. He got me my first major photo assignment, while I was still a student, working on book project for another Lehman professor. He was doing a book on Woodlawn Cemetery and asked my teacher's advice on how to get a photographer to do the accompanying thumbnails for the bios of the famous people buried there. My teacher, David, went and grabbed me, introduced me to the other professor and my photo career was born. I felt I was WAY over my head with this project, but David had more confidence in me than I had in myself. The book took 2 years to complete and Woodlawn hired me on to do all their PR/Advertising photos. I knew at that point that no matter what I did in this life, it HAD to involve my camera. From there I was hired as a lightman for a photo studio to help shoot weddings. Eventually, the studio started hiring me out to shoot their weddings. I continued to be a wedding photographer for about the first 10 years of my career. I had jobs working in photo stores during the week, but went out on my own in 1990.

I started picking up family shoots and building up a local following.


In the winter of 1991, I was introduced to Rae by virtue of a blind date. As soon as my eyes saw her, I KNEW she was the one! We got engaged the following year and married in the spring of 1993.

In 1997 I got a call from the Queens Borough President's Office to see if I was interested in putting in a bid to become the office's photographer. I submitted my proposal, went through several interviews and finally, the current BP, Claire Shulman asked me into her office and personally asked me to be their official photographer. That was one of the biggest breaks of my career. From there, over the next 17 years, I networked myself throughout the entire borough. I picked up countless clients. I left the BP office in the fall of 2014. All the connections I made during those 17 years are my clients today, and MANY more followed.

It is amazing to me of where my camera has taken me in the 40+ years. I have photographed Met games, I've been the photographer for the NYC St Patrick's Day Parade for 20 years, I've photographed the NY Auto Show for over 10 years, I have shot conferences all over the country, had an assignment in Russia, did underwater photography, music performances, US Open Tennis, and so much more.

I also do events for my alma mater, Holy Cross HS, as well as for Queens College. I have 2 great kids, Joey & David, who make me proud everyday with their successful careers. My wife of nearly 30 years, Rae, is a retire schoolteacher. We enjoy cooking and traveling as often as we can.

Photography has given me a life I could have never imagined and the people of Whitestone, and surrounding communities, have supported me throughout my career and I love helping out with community events as much as I



The Joint Apprenticeship and Training Committee (JATC) for Operating Engineers, Local Union 15, will be recruiting apprentices in March. The New York State Department of Labor announced on Monday that the recruiting period will be between March 6 and March 17, 2023 for five operating engineer (heavy equipment) apprentices. A form will be available online at http://local15recruitment.org -- Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., during the recruitment period -- to enter a lottery drawing to receive an application. Only one form can be submitted per person. Applicants who do not have computer access are recommended to visit their local library. Local Union 15 will randomly select 50 individuals from the lottery on March 22, 2023 at 10 a.m. Submitting the form does not guarantee receiving an application. The lottery drawing will take place at the south end of Lefferts Boulevard at JFK Airport in Queens. All applications must be completed and submitted to Operating Engineers, Local Union 15 by April 5, 2023. Eligible applicants must: Be at least 18 years old. Must provide proof of age at the time of enrollment in apprenticeship. Have a high school diploma or high school equivalency diploma (such as TASC or GED). Must submit proof with the complete application. Be able to legally work in the United States. Have a valid driver's license to operate company vehicles. Provide DD-214 (Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty), if applicable, after selection and prior to enrollment in apprenticeship. Be able to perform tasks involving coordination, motor skills and dexterity. Have reliable means of transportation to job sites and related instruction. Pass a drug screening, at the expense of the sponsor, after selection and prior to enrollment in apprenticeship. Pass a physical exam at the expense of the sponsor, after selection and prior to enrollment in apprenticeship. Pass an aptitude test administered by the Operating Engineers, Local Union 15 Training Center. Sign an affidavit stating they are physically capable of performing the essential functions of the apprenticeship without posing a threat to the health or safety of others, which may include: Working with hand and power tools. Climbing up onto and down from heavy equipment. Exposure to loud noise, hazardous machinery, hazardous voltages and respiratory irritants. Prolonged standing, climbing, walking, repeated squatting, stretching and bending. Working indoors and outdoors in extreme temperatures and weather conditions. Working in confined areas where movement is greatly limited. Lifting and moving heavy supplies and equipment. Working at heights, including bridges, scaffolding, ladders, etc. For more information, applicants should contact Operating Engineers, Local Union #15 at (718) 835-0400. Additional job search assistance can be obtained at your local New York State Department of Labor Career Center (see: dol.ny.gov/careercenters). Apprentice programs registered with the Department of Labor must meet standards established by the commissioner. Under state law, sponsors of programs cannot discriminate against applicants because of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex, disability or marital status. Women and minorities are encouraged to submit applications for apprenticeship programs. Sponsors of programs are required to adopt affirmative action plans for the recruitment of women and minorities.

By Robert Frost


He gives his harness bells a shake To ask if there is some mistake. The only other sound's the sweep Of easy wind and downy flake.


